FROM THE RECTOR

On Christmas Eve of 2021, a hundred of us gathered out in the snowy parking lot for a wonderfully chaotic and Spirit-filled service of "Las Posadas," a Latin American tradition of retelling the Nativity story. The energy was amazing, and we all went home giddy and filled with joy. The next week, Omicron slammed into the Northeast, and church shut down... again. We pivoted quickly (lots of practice!) and began gathering for worship and coffee hour on Zoom, but it was a punch to the gut for a fresh rector just starting to get her bearings.

This year has been a masterclass in flexibility and perseverance; an exercise in seeking God in unexpected places, and chasing down Spirit energy wherever and whenever we can. Witnessing this parish's ability to identify and lovingly magnify the love of the Divine has been a gift and a grace. I continue to be in awe of the resilience and big-heartedness of this place.

Pragmatically speaking, much of my first full program year has been dedicated to the work of stabilization, as we've slowly moved out of the shutdown/isolation phase of the pandemic and into a new and more integrated reality. For me, this has meant spending time cleaning up the church campus, learning how to use new equipment, reviving ministries that had gone dormant these past few years, and working to better understand our financial situation and administrative operating procedures.

As the CTK ship continues to right itself, our collective work shifts away from recovery and towards discernment. This coming year will be a time of reflection for us; a time to evaluate and prioritize what feels important to us, what we want to carry forward from this these past years, and what we feel can be left behind. The shape of this parish has changed, and while we grieve the loss of what was, we also embrace the signs of resurrection and transformation that are unfolding all around us.

I am so hopeful and energized for all that lies ahead for CTK, and so grateful to each of you for the love and care that you have shown me (and each other!) This community continues to fill me with deep and abiding hope – even and especially when I feel overwhelmed by the ongoing pandemic, the climate emergency, and widespread injustice and political upheaval. I am endlessly heartened by witnessing us do what we do best, which is to lovingly tend to our corner of the vineyard, knowing that the love and growth that is cultivated here ripples out into the world around us, in small and large ways. 


INTERNATIONAL FOLK SERIES

This fall, our Stewardship & Outreach Committee worked closely with longtime parishioner Robyn Boyd to sponsor an international folk music series of well-known touring artists. Robyn has long worked in the folk music industry, and gathered an incredible lineup of groups and individuals who came and performed in the nave on Sunday evenings.

Attendance at the concerts ranged anywhere from between 40-80+, and was comprised largely of community members – i.e., folks who likely would never have had a reason to set foot in CTK! Concerts were followed by a wonderful and delicious reception organized by Pam Hoveling & our Hospitality Crew. At each concert, we took up an additional collection in support of one of our partner organizations, and raised an additional \$250-400 donation to the Ulster Immigrant Defense Network, the Afghan Circle of the Hudson Valley, the Rondout Valley Food Pantry, and Rural & Migrant Ministry.

Our spring lineup is set with five concerts coming up, we are so excited for this next installment!

















MINISTRY HIGHLIGHTS

FEED MY SHEEP: THE CTK KITCHEN

Our new commercial kitchen has been a joy and a delight, albeit intimidating! With the new equipment in place, we dedicated much of this year to learning to use it, and ensuring that we remain in accordance with safety and health codes as required for our commercial status. In the late spring, we welcomed chef Chris Lanier of Ravenwood as a renter. Chris used the kitchen twice a week through the spring and summer, and we were grateful and inspired by the collaboration. As we head into the new year, our Kitchen Committee is looking towards creative ways to use the space, both as a resource to the community and also a source of income for CTK.

SUNDAY SCHOOL & CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

Under the leadership of Beth Vargas and with the support of Tess Hartman, Cathy Kreibich and Tasha Clemmer, our Sunday School program continued to thrive throughout the year. With a group of anywhere between 4-15 kids on any given Sunday, our teacher volunteers provided formation, guidance and a space for our kids to explore their faith lives. With a partner grant from Trinity Wall Street, we were able to subscribe to a dynamic curriculum called "Storymakers," which encourages creativity and wonder in engaging the stories of our faith.

Over the summer, Rev. Marcella created a "Prayground" in the back of the nave where children are invited to hang out during worship. It's been wonderful watching them take advantage of the books, beanbag chairs, and coloring books – and really enjoying their liturgical lounge space.

We also began a once-a-month "Eucharist for Everyone," a family-friendly service at the 10 a.m. Eucharist featuring youth readers and acolytes, lively music, and an interactive sermon-story from the chancel steps. This service is in it's "beta phase" and we're looking forward to expanding and improving it.

SACRED GROUND CONVERSATION CIRCLE

As part of our ongoing effort to become an anti-racist church, our Racial Justice Committee convened a group of 10 parishioners to engage with the Episcopal Church's "Sacred Ground" curriculum. The group gathered biweekly through the winter and spring to walk through chapters of America's history of race and racism, while weaving in threads of family story, economic class, and political and regional identity. For a variety of logistical reasons, our group was not able to complete the full 10-session series, and is looking forward to resuming this holy work

CONFIRMATION/REAFFIRMATION

In the fall, we kicked off an intergenerational Confirmation/Reaffirmation formation series for people looking to learn more about the Episcopal tradition, and those desiring a deep-dive into their relationship with God. The course is designed as a reflective and conversational engagement with the Baptismal Covenant from the Book of Common Prayer. Our group of 5 teenagers and 11 adults has been meeting monthly to have dinner together and to learn and talk about theology, the Bible, Church history, liturgy and sacraments, and much more to come as we finish out the course through the spring.

THE ULSTER DEANERY

The Ulster County Deanery is comprised of clergy and laypeople from the II Episcopal churches in the county. This past year, we have begun to gather to explore ways to collaborate, as the realities and demographics of our individual parishes continue to change. We met as a full cohort twice in 2022, and we are scheduled to meet next in March of 2023. The priorities for the group include Deanery-wide youth and children's ministries, as well as focusing on evangelism and sustainability within and among our congregations.

STEWARDSHIP

Our 2022 Annual Giving campaign was wonderfully successful, with a near 100% pledge rate from active parishioners! With Ryan Basten heading up the Stewardship Committee, we were able to raise over \$230K in pledge income through the year. We are so grateful for the faithfulness and generosity of this community – and all the ways that you contribute to the church with your time, treasure and talent.

STEWARDSHIP & OUTREACH: A GREAT COMBO

A wonderful point of growth this year has been the transformation of the Stewardship Committee. As we gathered to discuss fundraising strategies, we wanted to more fully embody "stewardship" as an ongoing spiritual practice, rather than a single, seasonal pledge drive. The Committee began to integrate community events and fundraisers into their ministry, helping to bring energy and support to our traditional fundraisers as well as the creation of new ones.



We've worked to incorporate an outreach component into all of our events and ministries, and have been able to provide financial support to local nonprofits that align with our mission, including the Rondout Valley Food Pantry, the Ulster Immigrant Defense Network, Rural and Migrant Ministry, the Ukrainian American Youth Association of the Hudson Valley, and others. The Stewardship Committee's holistic approach to fundraising and giving has felt very authentic to who we are and who we want to be as a parish, and we are looking forward to building upon this strategy in 2023.



2022 FINANCIAL REPORT

Our bookkeeping and finance team for 2022 consisted of Jodi Brooks serving as our bookkeeper, Aris Henderson as our CPA, and Pam Hoveling as treasurer – with the rector and vestry providing oversight. We are incredibly grateful for the hard work and tremendous patience of this team. As we move into 2023, we are transitioning leadership and bringing Tim Sweeney on as treasurer for the upcoming year.

- We spent this year continuing to develop and calibrate our accounting policies and procedures. We are beginning 2023 with an updated chart of accounts that more appropriately matches our financial context, and with a system in place that will provide clear and concise reports in accordance with the standards found in the Episcopal Church's Manual for Business Methods.
- Our 2023 budget is a conservative estimate based on the wider economic context, as well as our current operating costs.
- In 2022 we received close to \$400k from the Bronson Estate, which is currently being managed by Morgan Stanley. The Finance Committee will be working on developing a plan for the most effective use of our full endowment.
- The current balance of the Capital Campaign loan is \$326,122.84, with \$135K+ in the Capital Campaign account. The Finance Committee will be evaluating the most efficient way to manage loan, and exploring the option to continue to pay the monthly payment, or apply the account balance to the principal and refinance for a lower monthly payment.
